

Life Saving Report 2022-23



The 2022/23 season saw us start off patrolling early – contemplating on how the weather would treat us, which then came around with a vengeance shortening the season through the devastating effects of Cyclone Gabrielle being felt on the local community.

A big effort by all of our volunteers ensured that we maintained a high level of lifeguarding services throughout the season, along with moving into the observational patrols for the locals who wanted to enjoy the beach whilst access was ideally closed.

The resident rips required vigilant and proactive lifeguarding in order to warn unsuspecting beachgoers of the unseen dangers of swimming outside the flagged area. With the shortening of the season the number of rescues was down on previous seasons - 40 rescues and 231 assists. Assists continue to be on the rise, highlighting the 'swim between the flags' messaging.

With approximately 110 active lifeguards covering weekend days and statutory holidays throughout the season, each patrol put in a huge effort to keep the swimming public safe. Alongside the traditional inwater rescues and swimmer assists, our lifeguards tended to 10 major first aid incidents ranging from spinals, dislocated shoulders to broken arms and deep gashes. Alongside the major incidents our teams also tended to 39 minor first aid cases and performed 8 searches for missing children and

A big thanks must go out again to our Patrol Captains who lead our seven patrols - Damian, Darrell, Danny, Jason, JT, James/Pipi and Slim. Our beach would be a very different place without their professionalism, skills and leadership. Muriwai is a challenging beach to patrol, especially so when

the sea conditions provide health and safety challenges to our lifeguards. Patrol captains must conduct careful risk assessment and risk management to ensure that the swimming public are safe and that risks are mitigated and controlled so that our lifeguards are able to perform their tasks in a safe manner. The patrol captains are ultimately responsible for the leadership of a safe and successful patrol - thank














SAR Squad Report 2022-223



The past year has been a significant one for the Muriwai Lifeguard Search and Rescue Squad as we reflect on our accomplishments, challenges, and contributions to the local community.

We are proud to present this summary of our year in review, highlighting our involvement in supporting the Auckland Anniversary Kumeu flooding and the Cyclone Gabrielle community evacuation efforts, as well as our continuous commitment to local surf rescue situations.

Responding to Emergencies: During the year, our squad of 14 local lifeguards played a crucial role in assisting with the Auckland Anniversary flooding, primarily in rural Kumeu areas where our team rescued 6 people from dire flooding situations. These rescues highlighted the flexibility and commitment of our squad and garnered praise in both local and international media – featuring in the New York Times and Japan Times. Then, no less than two weeks later, Cyclone Gabrielle threw up a whole new set of challenges and tasks for our SAR squad (and wider club). Our highly skilled team swiftly and effectively responded to the call for help, demonstrating professionalism, courage, commitment, and teamwork in challenging and dangerous conditions. We worked alongside local and regional emergency services, seamlessly integrating our expertise and resources

to ensure the safety and well-being of our wonderful local community as they fled their homes and sought sanctuary at the Surf Club. Here the SAR Squad set up and operated a community evacuation centre alongside other MVLS and paid lifeguard service members. Our lifeguards stepped up, tackling tasks not typical nor expected of surf lifeguarding, but nevertheless applied their leadership, flexibility and communication skills to calm and support over 300 members of the local community, each with their own story of escape, evasion and sorrow. With no electricity, running water and later no cellphone communications, the challenges continued to mount as the storm cut a path through Muriwai that will be forever etched in our minds.


Local Surf Rescue Situations: In addition to our flooding and evacuation efforts, the Muriwai Lifequard Search and Rescue Squad remained dedicated to our ongoing surf rescue responsibilities. We responded to a number of local beach and surf situations throughout the year, safeguarding the lives of beachgoers and visitors to our community. Our vigilance, quick response times, and

effective coordination have earned us the trust and respect of both the local community and regional emergency services.

Training and Development: Throughout the year, the squad has consistently demonstrated professionalism and a commitment to excellence by actively pursuing opportunities to enhance our skills, knowledge, and capabilities. Training sessions, swift water flooding courses and joint exercises with local response organizations have enabled us to continually refine our incident response efforts and improve our operational readiness.

In conclusion, the Muriwai Lifequard Search and Rescue Squad has had a remarkable year, marked by our pivotal role in the Cyclone Gabrielle evacuation efforts. We remain dedicated to our mission of ensuring the safety and well-being of all who enjoy our coastal environment 24/7, continually striving for excellence and fostering strong community partnerships.



Muriwai Surf Sports Season Report 2022 - 23



The season began well with pool champs. The juniors coached by Mathew Mihaljevich and Ethan Mckolskey performed outstandingly as top medal winners at NR and NZ champs. The clubs only NZ champs of the year in seniors or juniors were Carter McKolskey and Ben Sullivan in the U12 Boys Tube Rescue at pool champs. There were countless other medals though across both events.

Seniors in the pool were coached by Fergus Eadie, who, when selected for the NZ team, meant the team largely self-lead during the championships. Some good masters results with one senior men's relay medal (a first for all the boys) and Ione Eadie with an individual bronze following on from her NZ record in the 50m with fins for U15 girls earlier in the season.

Pool champs trainings were Saturdays at NAC and Sundays at Fools Pools. We had 40 members register, with most competing.

Danny Tenhuevel led the boaties for another year. Mainly a girls U19 team which medalled at NR and had a silver and bronze at Nationals in Christchurch. A masters team also competed.

The seniors beach team benefitted from an NR initiative to fund a sports coach. Muriwai underwrote \$5k of these costs and their athletes did well training two or three times per week under Douggie Wilkins the former club junior coach. The target of the season was NR at Whangamata, but unfortunately that was cancelled due to Gabrielle. A series of twilight carnivals were undertaken at Orewa with some good results for Dylan Chapman U15 male (6) and

Mathew Mihaljevich (3) who picked up many medals between them. We had a total of 8 compete excluding the boats. Nationals were not on our calendar due to the logistics of Christchurch, but the team did the Owen Chapman at Red Beach with credit to Dylan who made the trip to ER and NZ champs by himself.

This next year sees a return to North Island with an influx of U15 into the squad, so would be great to have up to 15 compete.

Juniors had a great year. Once again led by Mathew and Ethan as head coaches ably supported by six or seven other seniors. The 40 strong Oceans training squad trained twice a week at Long Bay and Saturdays at Muriwai. A great early season carnival at Omaha showed the depth of the club. At NR champs





(severely restricted by early Gabrielle winds) the club won four golds (U11 and 13 boys and U12 and 14 girls) out of a total of eight in the board races, the only event completed in full. In the tricky conditions the team showed the impressive skills they have been developing. Had the carnival continued in the water there was every possibility the club would have won the Overall Points Trophy for possibly the first time.

Oceans saw 26 kids compete with amazing success. 7 medals were obtained. For perspective - in the previous 8 Oceans we had only won a total of 7 medals. The club won two relay medals U12 Boys Board and U12 Sprint which speaks to the depth the

club maintains. The club finished one behind Red Beach as top Northern Region Club on medals. Given other clubs have paid coaches and a beach they could access it is a remarkable effort from our kids, many who lost access to their homes in the aftermath of the storm.

Other fun events were maintained like the Beach Hop and Papamoa Camp. U10 joined also on Mondays as they are the future. All with the help of the senior sports team who donated many hours coaching and water safety.

At seasons end three athletes were nominated and selected as finalists at NR Awards of Excellence: Bridget Mihaljevich U14 Girls, Dylan Chapman U15 Boys, Ione Eadie U15 girls. Coaches Ethan and Mathew were nominated as coaches but failed to final in a very surprising decision given the results and time donated.

The author Rob Mihaljevich finished his tenure on the NR JOC and will be replaced by Brad Hagstrom. I move onto the Senior organising committee.

In conclusion, great results for the club at basically a cost neutral position.

Junior Surf Report 2022-23



Everyone was looking forward to a cracking season for 2022/23 with relative normality following an incredibly disrupted COVID season the year before.

And as we approached Christmas it looked as though we were going to get our wish. Following an absolutely stellar performance at Northern Region & National Pool Champs where we topped the medal count, we were blessed with Sunday after Sunday of great conditions at the beach, managed to get all the age group camps away, and welcomed lots of new families to the club.

Our Oceans Training Squad sessions were very well attended in what has become somewhat of a second home in Long Bay where our kids can develop crucial board handling skills in somewhat more predictable conditions.

Then the Auckland Anniversary weekend floods created significant water quality issues across the region. Northern Region was forced to postpone NR Champs by a week, coinciding with our booking for Papamoa Ocean's training. The difficult decision was made to ensure Muriwai was well represented at NR champs, and to postpone Papamoa until after Oceans.

NR Champs was held at Red Beach on 11th Feb, which was of course the day before Cyclone Gabrielle hit Auckland with full force. Needless to say, conditions were extreme. Several water events were successfully run, before abandoning the beach and running beach events at the nearby park. Our kids represented the club brilliantly, with plenty of medals to show for their efforts.

Whilst the cyclone prevented us running any further Sunday club days at Muriwai, our training squad kept up the mahi, and we had a full contingent put on an outstanding performance across all age groups at Oceans, hauling our largest ever medal count. The results are a testament to the great coaches, and juniors that we have at Muriwai, and the parents that invest the time and effort into ensuring everyone is where they need to be, when they need to be there.

With access to the beach remaining limited to residents only, our Club Champs for the season was held at Long Bay on a spectacular Sunday in March. With not a wave in sight, results were going to be down to sheer determination and athleticism, and our juniors did not disappoint. In a fitting nod to the determination of West Coast clubs, Bethells were running their club

champs at Long Bay on the same day too, right alongside us.



The 2022 / 2023 season Kicked off for Surf Lifesaving Northern region fairly conventionally but with a focus on covid recovery.

That was turned on its head late January with the wide-ranging effects of two storms in quick succession followed by the widespread devastation of cyclone Gabrielle in February.

It was sobering to hear at delegates meetings the challenges from large scale damage to a number of impacted Northern clubs. It will take years, heavy resourcing plus an enormous amount of work to address in a sustainable manner

Several clubs will never be 'the same' again out of necessity, particularly in a physical sense.

in other parts of the Annual Report, the way a team of Muriwai stalwarts pulled together tirelessly for weeks following the Cyclone devastation with the clubhouse as a hub for essential services, community centre was superb.


SLNR clubs were requested to consult with their membership and formally put to the vote at special meeting on June 21st whether the proposal

Description of Entity's Outcomes

The key purpose of Muriwai Volunteer Lifeguard Service ("MVLS") is to prevent injury and loss of life on one of Auckland's most popular beaches. MVLS ensures the beach is efficiently and effectively patrolled each weekend by volunteer guards from Labour weekend until Easter. In addition a range of surf sports helps keep members fit and healthy; and MVLS has a strong team of athletes competing in many disciplines across regional, national and international events. MVLS offers beach education initiatives, including an extensive Junior Surf programme, which develops the surf skills of hundreds of children as they work towards becoming lifeguards or becoming safe users of all beaches. MVLS is proud to be part of the Muriwai and greater Rodney community and hold an immense gratitude for each of their sponsors and supporters, without whom the provision of these services would be impossible.

Basis of Preparation

The entity has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000.
