














President & Chairman Report 2023-24



Life Saving Report 2023-24



The 23/24 season was our first season without any major event limiting the start or duration of it. With this we completed 7586 hours of patrolling, completing a recorded 55 Rescues, 64 Assists, 9 Major First Aid incidents, 86 Minor First Aid incidents, 13 Searches, 2030 Preventative Actions (PA's) involving 20982. members of the public.


The number of rescues was slightly up on the previous seasons, though that can be attributed to the longer season, the number of assists has dropped from 231 last season which shows with the number of PA's being undertaken. Our members have been more active and engaging to keep the public out of harm's way.

It was great to see the number of members upskilling this season, anywhere from gaining IRB Crewman's and/or moving up to IRB Drivers, First Aid and Advanced First Aid and RWC qualifications.

A big thank you to the Patrol Captains for the season, keeping our 6 patrols active and engaged, with the longer season sharing or swapping patrol dates to accommodate changes amongst yourselves to ensure we had patrols showing up to keep watch on the West Coast's busiest beach.

Lifeguard Search and Rescue Squad 2023-24



The Muriwai Volunteer Lifeguard Service's Search and Rescue Squad has had a relatively quiet year when compared to call-out statistics of the past 3-4 years.

This drop off in callouts appears to be driven by fewer visitor numbers and more favourable weather conditions in those areas around Muriwai which have previously experienced flooding and cyclone conditions. Nevertheless, the squad remained dedicated to the task and ready to respond 24/7/365. The squad did respond to a number of minor incidents outside of patrol hours and supported the paid lifeguard service for incidents requiring additional numbers.

New Equipment and Gear

The Muriwai SAR Squad was fortunate to have received Red Cross Cyclone Gabrielle funding to enhance the response capabilities of the squad and increase the safety of both the squad and the community. A number of new items of rescue equipment and personal protective gear have been procured during the year including the following:

New inflatable shelters, flood rescue equipment, portable petrol generator, solar panel, head torches, lights, first

aid equipment, lightweight patient stretcher, glow-sticks, admin packup, SLSNZ radios and a custom SAR equipment trailer. These items will now feature in future training exercises, ensuring that the squad are confident and competent to utilise the equipment in future incident responses.

SLSNZ Search and Rescue Summit 11 -14 April 2024

The Muriwai SAR Squad played host to the SLSNZ 2024 Search and Rescue (SAR) Summit over the period 11-14 April 2024. This year's theme, "Go Light and Long," emphasised the importance of long-distance deployments and practical learnings from nationally significant SAR exercises. The summit combined dynamic theory sessions with operational reviews and intensive scenario-based activities, challenging participants both physically and mentally.

Attendees engaged in risk assessments, hazard identification, and intelligence gathering for police searches. Practical

exercises focused on search patterns for multiple crafts and applying the Coordinated Incident Management System (CIMS) to manage SAR operations.

Muriwai Beach provided an ideal setting for lifeguards and SAR professionals to advance their search and rescue skills and knowledge. This annual event continues to play a crucial role in improving New Zealand's search and rescue capabilities.

Our rookie of the year this season was Josh Irving, he has already shown promising lifeguarding skills including overcoming language barriers whilst educating beachgoers and moving them into the flags. Josh is always respectful during all our rookie sessions and has a strong desire to improve each year.

Thanks to the Patrol Captains and their lifeguards who have welcomed our rookies with open arms and led by example. Sports Convenor Report Season 2023-24







Sport at Muriwai this past summer can only be described as a success. Our Junior Program reached peaks not seen for many years, Boaties continue to go from strength to strength under the guidance of the indefatigable Danny Tenheuvel and enthusiasm of Brad Seamen. Our seniors provided invaluable support to our Junior program, accessed a high level coaching set up thanks to the boards support and achieved some notable success.

Juniors

The junior program has been on the rise for several years and well and truly revealed itself to all this season. Returning coaches Mathew Mihaljevich and Ethan Mckolskey built on their work of the last two years, were joined by Ocean Michael and Maya Duckworth and delivered staggering success and engagement. Ably assisted by first year


junior sports coordinator Heidi Watson a formidable team delivered some incredible results.

Highlights include

- Top junior club at northern region pool champs
- Top NR and second junior club at National Pool Champs
- Top NR club and winner of Cath and Eddie Miller Cup at NR Juniors. With more gold medals than all other clubs combined.
- Ten medals including three gold at Oceans, 13 different athletes won medals due to relay success, showing depth of squad.
- Biggest Oceans team ever of 39
- Cooper Hagstrom first Muriwai individual gold medal in Water event at an Oceans
- First Gold Medal in Relay events at Oceans; U13 Beach and U14 Board

With such a shift to high performance and growth of the squad it is natural that there are some growing pains. With a still young coaching team there were some parents getting too excited about results which caused descension. Also of note is the U14 Athletes graduating are all now so invested in surf sports that they will likely leave the club for a full senior surf training timetable.

It will be the end of an era with many of these junior coaches now moving on to permanent jobs. The club will need to consider options going forward as to a replacement. Combined with the limited amount of seniors staying at the club we will have some issues to work through. We have obtained outstanding results for limited commitment outside of the Glen Cotterill Foundation for the last three years. This will need to change next year. Boaties:











Danny and Brad have a couple of great young womens crews and a dedicated masters crew. They were active in the national surf boat series travelling up and down the North Island. Highlighted by multiple medals at Nationals for our u19 Girls crews and Masters.

It was a shame to see Boats removed from the program for NR champs. There are some issues for the sport to work through.

Seniors

The same issues that plague Seniors for virtually every club still keep the club from thriving. Work commitments for older kids take over to ensure that they can contribute to an ever increasing financial demands of life. Nonetheless we had a core group of 12 who contributed to juniors coaching, attended Northern Region Champs in Whangamata. The club generously contributed \$5,000 to the cost of Senior Coach Joe Wilson. Joe did a great job, however a change in the training nights

meant a number of athletes were no longer able to attend.

In competition we had some memorable results. A gold medal at Northern Regions for our U17 Boys tube rescue stands out. Unfortunately the boys could not do nationals, but all the teams that won medals at nationals were in the Northern Region field. A tight group of seven U15 girls had a great season. The Owen Chapman Carnival saw financial reward for some and was a highlight. Adara Matthews also bucked the trend by becoming the first Muriwai female to paddle a ski at nationals for many years.

Earlier we undertook some pool training with the help of Oliver Eadie. His experience was very valuable and much needed with so many young athletes in seniors. Unfortunately nationals coincided with national waterpolo champs so few could enter. But success was had at Northern Region pool champs, Bridget Mihaljevich with

several top three finishes.

In conclusion we are at an important time for Sports in the club. We have relied on essentially a talented group of young athletes giving up their time to coach. We may need to revert to a traditional paid coach role going forward. I will work with the Junior Team and come up with some solutions.

Thanks for your support through the past year. I am still convinced active club sport involvement for our new young guards repays itself with a commitment to life guarding.


A keen group of parents and kids also attended the Ruakaka carnival on the

Recommendations for **Next Year**

Prior to the start of the 2023 / 24 season, Surf Lifesaving Northern Region clubs were requested to consult with their membership and formally put to the vote at special meeting on June 21st whether to proceed with a final vote whether to consolidate SLSNR with Surf Lifesaving New Zealand. The vote to proceed with the consolidation was passed unanimously, effective from the 1st of October 2023. 
